The species occurs in New South Wales and Queensland.

The berries are a popular traditional bushfood, eaten by indigenous Australians and

non-indigenous people.



### HEIGHT

Up to 2m

#### **SPREAD**

1.4m

#### **HABIT**

Spreading heathland shrub

### **FORM**

Midgen berry leaves are 1-3 cm long and 0.5 cm wide, lanceolate to elliptical, glossy above and silky hairy beneath.

# **FLOWERS**

The white flowers are 1 cm across, followed by dotted mauve edible berries.

# **FLOWERING PERIOD**

In its natural habitat A. dulcis flowers in spring and summer while in Canberra the flowering time is summer to mid-autumn.

## **FRUIT**

Dotted mauve edible berries. The melt-in-the-mouth berries are sweet and aromatic, with a pleasant gingery flavour. While recognized as having good flavour qualities, the berries have not been commercialized due to harvesting and handling issues.

# **CLIMATIC TOLERANCES**

Midgen is also popular in amenity horticulture as an adaptable shrub for a variety of situations, handling a range of soils and climatic conditions.

### **HORTICULTURE**

Austromyrtus dulcis is a relatively easy species to propagate. Fresh cleaned seed germinates in 3-4 weeks while uncleaned fruits take about a week longer. Although the testa (the outer coat) of the seed is hard no mechanical scarification is necessary. Propagation from cuttings is also easy.
