COMMON NAME

ORIGIN DESIGN USE Babingtonia similis

No generally accepted common name; Howie's Feathertips Central coast of New South Wales to South East Queensland

Hedge and used in rock gardens-

HABIT

Medium Shrub

FLOWERS

The small tea tree-like flowers are about 5mm in diameter, white in colour and occur in groups of about 3 from the leaf axils towards the ends of the branches.

FORM

Often rounded and compact with leaves that are 9-17 mm long, linear to elliptical in shape. The branchlets are numerous and pendulous, with narrow leaves.

CLIMATIC TOLERANCES

Tolerant of at least moderate frost

HORTICULTURE

It grows best in full sun to dappled shade. It is a hardy plant, suited to light or heavy soils as long as drainage is reasonable.
