



SPECIES	Acacia falcata
COMMON NAME	Sickle Wattle, Sally, Silver-leaved Wattle
ORIGIN	New South Wales and Queensland
DESIGN USE	Stabilizer plant to revegetate roadways



HEIGHT

2–5m

SPREAD

2m

HABIT

Small tree or large shrub.



FORM

Erect or spreading with smooth or finely fissured or sometimes deeply fissured bark, branchlets angled or flattened and glabrous.

FLOWERS

Inflorescence consists of 6–20 in racemes, or sometimes in panicles, pale yellow to cream-coloured.

FLOWERING PERIOD

April–August



FRUIT

straight to slightly curved, mostly straight-sided to barely constricted between seeds, thinly leathery, glabrous, often pruinose.

BARK / TRUNK

Acacia falcata has grey or black bark.

CLIMATIC TOLERANCES

Grows in sclerophyll forest, mainly in coastal divisions.

HORTICULTURE

They prefer full sun and well drained positions.
